

Making time for God in a time-poor life

If you are anything like me, you will find it very hard to make time on an average day for any kind of spiritual discipline. Discovering some useful apps has been part of the answer for me; they help structure daily times with God by giving devotional time a framework and providing inspiration and discipline when I can't find any.


A daily opportunity to join in with morning and evening prayer online can be found on the Church of England's 'Pray' app. Here you can tune in to a pre-recorded service and follow the readings and responses with prayers, a Psalm, a Bible reading and intercessions. I've used this app for a couple of years, doing the Prayer During the Day with a cup of tea first thing in the morning – it takes about 15 minutes, so great if you are very short of time. which I haven't had time to investig yet, but which look very interesting like the opportunity to join a 'faith journey' exploring topics like paren relationships, career, calling, wellbe forgiveness and others. Using an app to structure a devotior life won't be everyone's cup of tea pun intended!), but if you are strugg to find time or inspiration for Bible reading, prayer, meditation or other devotional activities, it is worth lool

I began to feel that 15 minutes wasn't giving me time to reflect on the readings and two other apps have done something to fill that need. Unlike the other two apps mentioned here, which are free, the 'Soultime' app needs a subscription, but it's worth it. It offers daily 5-minute meditations on all sorts of topics (forgiveness, gratitude, God's love) and there is an online questionnaire which means that meditations are tailored to your personal interests. The app also contains the whole Bible, hymns, sleep stories, an online journalling tool and some fascinating interviews from a podcast series.

Finally, the Church of England's 'Everyday Faith' app gives six days' worth of material around a specific theme each week. There's a Bible reading, a reflection, a suggested response action and a prayer for each day -all of which can be listened to in ten minutes. (A second early cup of tea in the morning now seems a good idea.) Everyday Faith has some other features which I haven't had time to investigate yet, but which look very interestinglike the opportunity to join a 'faith journey' exploring topics like parenting, relationships, career, calling, wellbeing, forgiveness and others.

Using an app to structure a devotional life won't be everyone's cup of tea (no pun intended!), but if you are struggling to find time or inspiration for Bible reading, prayer, meditation or other devotional activities, it is worth looking into. There is a huge range of devotional apps available. It would be really interesting to hear from anyone else who has an app that they have found useful in helping them to maintain their devotional life

From the Archives

I have recently had cause to look through the Parish magazines to search out the history of the Lych Gate. I thought it might be interesting to share with you the various entries that I found from 1901 -1902. Just to give the context you need to know that Queen Victoria died on 22nd January 1901 having reigned from 20th June 1837 until her death. In the November Outlook I quoted from the Church magazine of 1901 which talked about a meeting called on July 18th 1901 to consider building a Lych Gate as a fitting memorial to Queen Victoria. Then last month I reported that plans were starting to get underway. This month I will I can give you an update on what happened next.....

'THE QUEEN VICTORIA MEMORIAL

Although there has been a fairly general response to the circular which was sent out asking subscriptions to the above, vet the amount promised so far is not large. So far as the Committee can, at present, find out the cost of the proposed Lych Gate would be about $\pounds 150$, whilst the alterations to the present approach to the Church and Vicarage would cost another £50, whereas the amount already promised is only about £60. The subscription list will remain open for another fortnight to allow further promises to be received, and if at the end of that time the Committee do not consider that promises of a sufficient amount have been received to justify them in carrying out the work, a meeting of Subscribers will be called to consider some

alternative scheme. A suggestion has been made that an apparatus for chiming the quarter hours, attached to the clock, might be a suitable form for the memorial to take, But after all it seems a great pity that the scheme for the Lych Gate which at the same time would be a most suitable memorial, and a very handsome addition to the Church and Village, should be allowed to drop for want of funds.'

Oh dear it looked as if the Lych gate might never have been built but the next entry in the Parish magazine was this....



'THE LYCH GATE

'The Lych Gate as a Memorial to H.M. the late Queen is at last in progress. The design is that of Mr Kinneir Tarte, whilst the Committee have entrusted the work to Mr. E. Glenister, we hope that now that the work is really started, good progress may be made and the Memorial soon complete. A design of the Gate is now hanging in the Church Porch. Mr High, the Hon Secretary will be glad to receive any further subscriptions.'

JUDY ROE (nee Grinham) MBE Part 3

After swimming, Judy's attention turned to Hockey. From being a complete novice, she rose to become captain of the 2nd XI and played in the 1st team that won the Middlesex Championships twice. With other parents she started a football club at her son's primary school doing the admin and managing to get matches for the boys after contacting other schools. The team was known as Northwood Juniors. She then, with others, started a colts team at Eastcote Hockey Club, again doing all the admin. Both her son Keith and daughter, Alison, joined the Colts aged 8, and 9 and a half, and Keith became an international indoor hockey player and Alison played Junior County.

Sadly, her marriage was not working and she and her husband decided to divorce. The family home was sold, and the children came to live with her and her widowed mother. Her son attended a private school for his secondary education and, as the fees rose, Judy decided to get a job to help finance this and she obtained a post as a Field Fundraiser for Barnardos. She was surprised to get the job as she only had 2 O Levels as her swimming had greatly interrupted her education. However, they were both in English and this has stood her in good stead for the rest of her life. Evidently all her experience in setting up the football and hockey teams and the press releases she had written

was enough and she was offered the job on the spot. It was ideal as she could work from home so could also be there for her children. After three and a half years she was promoted into the training department and trained fundraisers, going around the country and setting up courses for another three and a half years. The workload became overwhelming, and Judy resigned. She then worked for Abbeyfield as a consultant fundraiser.

One day she had a phone call from Barnardos saying that the head of training was retiring and asked her if she was interested in the job. After a very informal interview she was offered the job and returned to Barnardos as head of training for seven years when she was then made redundant. Her redundancy pay helped to buy her second husband, Mike's boat which became a lifeline for him as he battled cancer. Within a month Judy got a job with the Samaritans as a consultant fundraiser and thoroughly enjoyed meeting the branch managers and being seen as a colleague rather than someone from 'Head Office'. She reluctantly left the Samaritans as Mike was no longer able to work, and with his boat down in Cornwall it made sense to move down there.

Judy had met Mike Roe at a dinner party given by a colleague in 1979. The house had a swimming pool attached and Mike said he fell in love with Judy when he saw her swimming. They were very happily married for over 25 years. They moved into Abbots Road into a 5 bedroomed house that needed a lot of repairs, and they worked so hard to make it liveable. Mike and Judy lived in several houses in Abbots Road until their move to Cornwall. During this time Judy was Parish Secretary for a short while. After Mike died in 2010 Judy decided to move back to Abbots where she lived with her dog Sam until she emigrated to New Zealand last September. She wrote the articles for Parish People for over 8 years (until she persuaded me to take over) and was also a member of the church choir.

50 years after her outstanding achievements in swimming Judy was at last formally recognised and awarded the MBE thanks to pressure on the government from her daughter and the swimmer Duncan Goodhew. What a difference from the instant glory and rewards given to today's sports personalities!

After last night's race I spoke to Philippa Gould, a New Zealand swimmer who had travelled halfway round the world to finish third behind Judy. She said "I'm delighted Judy won, just as pleased as if I had won myself. For Judy is the most lovable person I have ever met" And that's a pretty nice thing to say about someone who has just beaten you hollow and made your own record look like a snail's pace. But all the swimming world talk that way about Judy.

God Bless Judy. We will miss you.

From the Curate

The start of the new year always brings a sense of possibility. We reflect on the year gone by – its highs and lows, its lessons and losses – and we turn our faces toward the future. Many of us arrive in January with New Year's resolutions ready to go; grand plans to finally get fit, eat better, spend less, or just generally cultivate better habits.

These resolutions, though wellintentioned, often carry with them an unspoken pressure to be perfect. By mid -January, that pressure can feel like a real burden. Some of us might already have broken a resolution or given up on one entirely. So, we begin our year already feeling like a bit of a failure.

Recently on retreat, I spent some time thinking about this, as I was reading Emma Ineson's books *Failure*, which I can heartily recommend. Failure is a tricky word, and a scary one too. It comes to us from the Old French verb faillir, meaning 'to lack' or 'to fail.' In English it was originally a verb only, and it wasn't until the seventeenth century that it was used as a noun – a failure. Ineson writes: "Worst of all is 'a failure.' It is a name. A title. An identity. Not just someone who fails or deals with failure but is, inside and out. A Failure. End of. It feels so final."

But here's the thing: failure isn't something to fear. In fact, for Christians, failure is essential to the way we understand both our lives and our faith.

Think about it. At first glance, Jesus' ministry might look like a story of



failure. He was born in a stable, not a palace. He gathered a ragtag group of followers, not a conquering army. He didn't overthrow Rome, as many hoped the Messiah would. And then, after just three years of public ministry, he was betrayed, abandoned, and executed. From the world's perspective, Jesus' death was a humiliating failure - the end of his mission and his life. But what looked like a failure to the world was, in fact, the ultimate triumph. Through the resurrection. God revealed a truth that goes deeper than our human understanding: even in what seems like defeat. God is at work.

"In order to know whether something is a failure you need to know which plan it didn't go according to. And sometimes we are considered to have failed due to other people's expectations being wrong. Jesus looked like a failure... But according to God's plan – the redemption of humanity and eternal salvation through death and resurrection – he was a resounding success." This perspective on failure changes everything. It means that our mistakes, our setbacks, and our broken resolutions are not the end of the story. Of course, there are different types of failures. Some big, some small. Some to be embraced (e.g., failures we make on the way to discovery). And some to be avoided at all costs (e.g. when our failures have hurt others and broken trust.) Most weeks in our worship at St Lawrence, in the confession, we say together, "... heavenly Father, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour, in thought and word and deed, through negligence, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault." I certainly find these categories helpful each week as I recall the ways in which I've failed that week!

Failure, in this context, is not simply about messing up or making mistakes. It's about recognizing where we've fallen short, acknowledging it, and bringing it before God with a repentant heart. Confession is not a moment of shame but an act of trust in God's boundless grace. In those moments, we're reminded that failure doesn't define us—God's love does.

The truth is, many of us fear failure because it feels tied to our sense of worth. When we fail, we're not just upset about the mistake itself—we often feel ashamed, as though the failure says something about who we are. That fear can be crippling. It stops us from taking risks, from trying new things, and even from being honest about our struggles.

But failure isn't something to be feared. It's a place we can dwell for a moment, a space where we can learn and grow. When we stop running from failure and face it, we often find unexpected gifts: humility, resilience, and a deeper understanding of ourselves and God. In fact, failure can become a profound teacher. When we look at our setbacks and mistakes through the lens of grace, we see that they are not dead ends but stepping stones. They remind us of our need for God and open our hearts to His work in our lives.

In His hands, the ending is always one of love, redemption, and hope. Failure might shape a chapter or two, but it will never have the final word. That belongs to God—and His word is always one of grace.

Happy New Year, and may you find courage, hope, and peace in God's love for you throughout the year ahead.
