JUDY ROE (nee Grinham) MBE Part 2

The effect of winning an Olympic Gold Medal had a huge impact on Judy's life. There were paparazzi outside her front door, endless invitations to open events, present things, speak at lunches and dinners and give swimming demonstrations. All the fees went to the Amateur Swimming Association as otherwise Judy would have lost her amateur status and could no longer compete. It was overwhelming for a basically shy person.

Judy decided to change her stroke for a while and started to compete as a freestyle swimmer, again reaching the top two of the British rankings. She swam in competitions in Germany, China and Russia as a freestyler but during the trip to China she was asked to do a back stroke race. To her great surprise she equalled the world record although she had not been training on that stroke. She was the Ladies' captain of the English team and during this visit she was able to see something of China and met the Chinese Premier Chou en Lei. Judy was also invited to do a four-week tour of South Africa which was extended by another six days so that she could compete in the South African Championships in which she won two events. She also really enjoyed being in the sun as opposed to a freezing English winter. While in South Africa Judy realised that swimming could not go on running her life. The training was soul destroying and she had missed out on all the normal teenage activities. From 12 years old until 19 years her whole life had been



dedicated to swimming. Her ambition became centred on one final effort to add both the Empire and European backstroke titles to her Olympic success. At the Empire Games Judy won two gold medals and set a new World Record. The European Games followed in which she won silver and bronze for freestyle events, much to her delight, and then the gold medal for the backstroke. The next few months were the most indecisive of her life as she knew that she should retire but couldn't imagine a life without swimming.

Judy became the first woman in any sport to hold Olympic, Commonweath and European gold medals at the same time. She did a series for the BBC Sportsview Unit and was then approached by a film company to play a part in a film, Operation Bullshine, as they wanted to use the Judy Grinham name. The studio took 'glamour' photos and the fact that she was in the film gave it a lot of publicity. The film starred Ronald Shiner, Donald Sinden and Dora Bryan, however, filming did not attract her as a career, but she had earned good money which gave her time to think. On the eve of her 20th birthday, in March 1959, Judy

announced her retirement. The following morning the Daily Express announced that she had joined their staff as a trainee journalist to cover swimming. She also visited schools who had built swimming pools and developed a brand of swimwear for children. She appeared on Desert Island Discs with Roy Plumley in 1959 and published her

autobiography 'Water Babe' in 1960.

At 20 she became engaged to a local journalist, married at 21 and had two children, a son when she was 22 and a daughter at 23. In hindsight she feels that she married too early as she really had had no life experiences and certainly had had no time to gain experience with men. So she began the 'burying' of Judy Grinham the celebrity. She didn't want her children to be known as 'Judy Grinham's children' and over the years has become more and more reticent and reluctant to talk about her amazing achievements during her teenage years. She decided that she needed to look forward and leave the swimmer behind otherwise the rest of her life would be an anti-climax...

From the Vicar

November was not a great month for the Church of England.

The Archbishop of Canterbury resigned in disgrace – something quite unprecedented – and many are calling for several more bishops, and swathes of other clergy, to do the same.

Behind it all lies a catalogue of awfulness. It begins back in the Seventies and Eighties with savage beatings of boys by a sadistic pervert, John Smyth, who posed as a respected spiritual leader on youth camps. His crimes became known to a group of Church of England ministers, who then covered it up. Who thought, in the words of one, 'it would do the work of God immense damage if this was made public.' They shipped Smyth off to Africa, without properly warning the Africans, and so he continued to beat and flog for decades. Black boys, perhaps, don't count quite so much. One died in circumstances that have never been properly investigated.

When in 2013 Smythe came back on the Church of England radar again, when an English victim made a formal complaint, nothing really happened. It was – sort of – passed to the police (whose own failure to pursue Smyth also merits inspection), and then, pretty much, dropped. There was no real interest in what the police were doing, no loud alarm bells rung in Africa, no real care for the victims here. And now, in a pathetic final twist, it has been suggested that the Church might not even offer Smyth's victims



compensation, because apparently he had nothing to do with us. Even if that were true, which it isn't, it completely ignores the cover-up, which allowed that abuse to go on, which told victims they did not count, and which was carried out by Church of England clergymen.

It was *not*, incidentally, carried out by Justin Welby. It will take some time for the dust to settle, and for it to be clear quite how much censure the Archbishop personally deserves. Those who say that he withheld information from the police are incorrect; those who say that he lied have yet to prove their point. No doubt there is much to criticise in how he, or Lambeth Palace, handled the Smyth case. No doubt either that as the man at the top, he bears responsibility for the Church's generally woeful approach to abuse over the decades. He was right to resign. Still, historians in calmer times will judge that he was far from the worst Archbishop we have ever had. For it to be his tenure that ends in ignominy is rough justice indeed.

There is however a danger in focusing too much on Justin Welby. The issues raised by the Smyth case go *far* beyond him. We need to ask what it is about the Church that makes us especially

vulnerable to predators (not, of course, that abuse is unknown elsewhere – far from it – but there does seem to be a lot of it in the Church). There's a whole mixture of factors in play here. To name but a few: our susceptibility to strong, charismatic leaders, and our willingness to bend the rules for them; our habit of believing the best of people, sliding into naiveté; a fascination in some quarters with blood and suffering; a repressive approach towards human sexuality; the belief in an angry, punishing patriarchal God; confusion about what forgiveness means, and the tendency to allow it to eclipse the need for justice. It's a dangerous cocktail, and a proper response to abuse within the Church will involve a fairly sharp audit of all these things.

And then of course there is the whole theology contained in that revealing remark by one of those clergy who knew about Smyth, and chose to conceal it: 'it would do the work of God immense damage if this was to be made

public.' Where to begin? What work of God could possibly require allowing hideous abuse to continue? If the speaker meant that people might leave the Church, what is the justification for believing that *that* is all God is interested in, all He is working for? Do we think His work is *not* about justice, and healing, and restoration? And what kind of God needs a group of vicars to act as his wingmen, looking out for His interests and defending Him against the wicked world? Not the God made flesh in Jesus Christ, who made it perfectly clear on the Cross that self-defence was not among his priorities – let alone the reputation of a religious institution.

There is some very bad theology at work here, theology that needs a good purge regardless of who happens to occupy the seat of Canterbury. And yet, to speak of theology – whilst it is genuinely important - is in a way to over-complicate matters. In essence, the John Smyth case is really, really simple. That man was a vicious criminal, guilty of many counts of actual of grievous bodily harm, and in Africa quite possibly of homicide. The people who knew about and who withheld that information from the police were accessories after the fact, and could have been charged with conspiracy to prevent the course of justice. We may be the Body of Christ, one, holy, catholic and apostolic ... but we're also just another human institution, subject to the same sins, and the same laws, as everyone else. If this awful month for the Church teaches us that lesson, that at least is one brand snatched from the burning.

Kristina visited several local schools in our area and gave the pupils a chance to create designs to be brought to life on the outside of St Lawrence. They were given templates of the elevations and a lesson on what sort of thing might be possible. The theme was Remembrance. Hundreds of people from all around the village came to have a look and also enjoy a cup of hot chocolate. All donations for the hot chocolate were for the Friends of St Lawrence. The event was supported by the Abbots Langley Parish Council and Warner Bros. The schools involved were Parmiter's, St Michael's and Future Academies.

From the Archives

I have recently had cause to look through the Parish magazines to search out the history of the Lych Gate. I thought it might be interesting to share with you the various entries that I found from 1901 -1902. Just to give the context you need to know that Queen Victoria died on 22nd January 1901 having reigned from 20th June 1837 until her death.

Last month in Outlook I quoted from the Church magazine of 1901 which talked about a meeting called on July 18th 1901 to consider building a Lych Gate as a fitting memorial to Queen Victoria. This month I will I can give you an update on what happened next.....
